One of the most uplifting parts of our quarterly PLUM Board Meeting experiences is the "Sharing of Our Congregational Stories" of how we see the Lord working in and through each of our various congregations as we attempt to be relevant with a world that is ever changing. What happens if the Lord is using the collective supportive connection of our 11 small congregations to assist us in being the agile Body of Christ in the 21<sup>st</sup> century?

Oh, to be sure, there will always be the pain of change and adaptation that is ever present as we live in an ever evolving world. But isn't that where our collectivity can be helpful, as we allow this "awesome God" to be our strength?

Recognizing the blessings of our past, I am so excited when I look to the journey of our future. And to borrow "and modify" the mantra of Captain James T. Kirk of the starship Enterprise in the Star Trek episodes of the mid 1960s, "May we boldly (be willing to) go where no one has gone before."

#### "THE LIGHT OF CHRIST. THANKS BE TO GOD"

With these words, the Great Vigil of Easter begins. Following the lighted Easter (Paschal) Candle, the worshippers enter the hall to prepare for the Easter Vigil Lessons. Reactions to the Vigil vary from "it's too long" to "it's the most dramatic, meaningful worship of the year." One thing is certain; it is the oldest liturgy in the history of the Christian Church. Its significance is unquestioned. Therefore the PLUM pastors have decided to dedicate the PLUM Lenten Study to a study of the Vigil and its parts.

The weekly study will focus on parts of the Vigil: Week of 3/1/20: **The Opening of the Vigil and the Easter Proclamation** 

Week of 3/8/20: The first half of the Readings: (Creation – Flood – Red Sea) Week of 3/15/20: The second half of the Readings (Valley of Dry Bones – Jonah – The Fiery

Furnace.)

Week of 3/22/20: The Baptismal Renewal and the Litany of the Saints

Week of 3/29/20: The Easter Eucharist (Holy Communion) – John 20.1-18

The **Sunday Service** will focus on a theme from Scripture and the Vigil. A **study insert** will be included in the bulletin for that Sunday, and **the sermon** will highlight the theme of the week. There will also be **a book**, which will be available to all and from which the theme of the week will be highlighted.

Over all the hope is that this will produce a comprehensive and cohesive Lenten Study experience that will deepen spiritual development and make your Lenten and Easter time more meaningful to you and your family. Watch your Sunday bulletin for more information as we approach and enter Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, February 26<sup>th</sup>. This year Easter Vigil is Saturday, April 11.
